

## La! Tea In the Park!

We hope to see you there, and we hope to cooperate on many gatherings in years to come.

The Bridgerton theme we have chosen is in the Regency-style. This is also the time period of Jane Austen books. High-waisted gowns, men in tailcoats and early top hats, lots of short curly hair-dos\* for men and women alike. In America, it was Dolley Madison times, see the attached picture of her in a high-waisted gown. Dolley was a noted party-thrower, hosting dinner parties, social events, and Wednesday evening drawing rooms.\*\*







What were these dinner parties and social events like? Let's begin with breakfast; a wedding breakfast! Your own breakfast was taken in your quiet bedchamber, or from a buffet of breakfast foods served in the dining room, but a party breakfast was served at 3 in the afternoon, and had a lot more turtle soup than you want at any time of day. Also, a wedding cake that was fruit cake, and ham and eggs. Probably kidneys. Next social event in the day: tea! Well, no. Tea as a social gathering was not usual. Tea was consumed in the morning, and after dinner.\*\*\* Now, dinner was served as a soup course, a main course, and a salad & cheese course, with as many as 25 different dishes on the table for each course, in a mix of sweet and savory. It was usually a spectacle, with fancy presentations for everything. If it could be stacked, stood on end, or molded into a new and interesting shape, it was. Then the ladies left the table for the drawing room, and sewed and chatted until the men came out from the table, where they had remained eating walnuts and drinking port and smoking. Dolley Madison skipped the company for dinner, and just had the chatting-in-the-drawing-room part. How about a ball? They were all at night, and hopefully in the ballroom on your premises, but might have to be at some Assembly Rooms. They had a refreshment room, sometimes card rooms.\*\*\*\* Have you ever heard of a Rout? It was an evening party where everyone the family knew was invited to cram into the house all at one time. People were injured.\*\*\*\*\*How about a musicale? The hostess would hire musicians, and then have her musical children perform as well. As you can see, there were too many opportunities for good times to just have tea parties. We're going to though.
