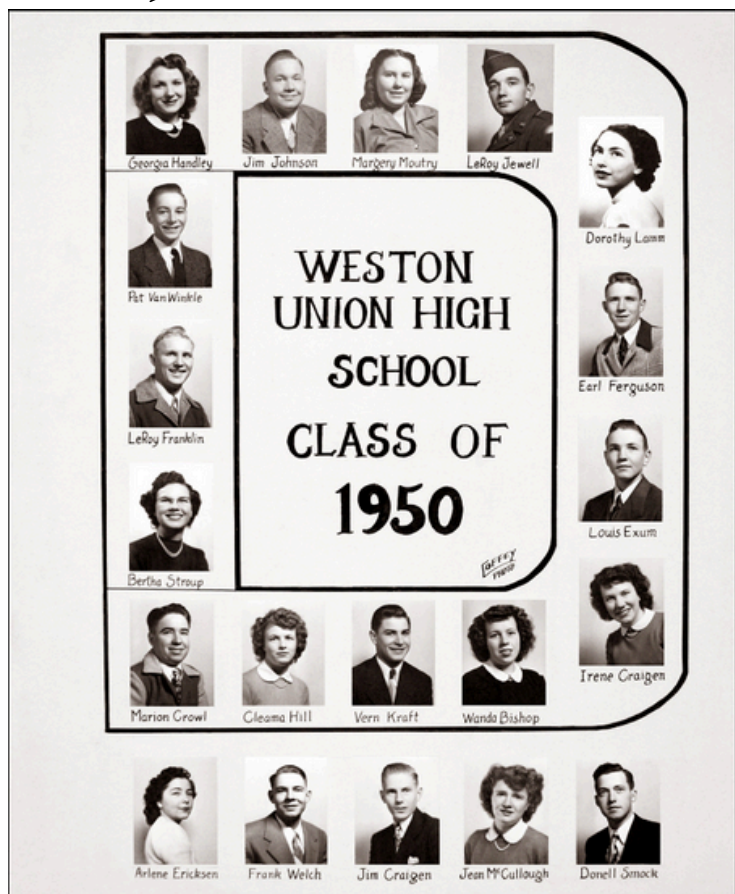

Old Timey Country Weddings



The wedding industry is a little shaky at the moment. Venues, flowers, dresses, cakes have become more expensive. Vendors* are difficult to coordinate. The young couple of today is not blessed with a great deal of starter money. A big splashy wedding is not only unattractive for monetary reasons, but is also a bit out of style. In fact, these young people seem to be in a rather 19th century situation where their weddings are concerned. Like an Oregon Territory kind of wedding, with few amenities but plenty of love. After all, lacking in money has never meant lacking in friends, family, and well-wishers.

I'm a big believer in Do It Yourself. There are so many how-to videos on the internet, and so many patterns and instructions to help makers turn out the most charming lines of decorations and favors and hors d'oeuvres that a large wedding need not be fancy in price. Library users have access to books, dvds, and magazines that help with learning to arrange flowers, bake a selection of tiny nibbles, print attractive invitations. You can even learn to effectively smoke brisket in large quantities, or deep fry turkeys safely, or fire roast salmon on planks. I myself have always wanted to bake a simple wedding cake, recipes for which are to be found in cooking magazines to be found in the library in paper form AND on our Libby downloadable digital content app.

Dresses and DJs and tuxes and liquor will always be with us. Professional photographers are indispensable. I think it's always best to have the wedding at a neutral place like a paid venue, to avoid conflict on a hectic and already fraught day. There are always discount racks at the dress shop, and the groom and his party probably have access to suits or sport jackets. I don't think it's a great idea to depend on friends or relatives to pour the drinks, because they are neither licensed nor insured and accidents with alcohol are to be avoided at all costs. Your photographer will be concentrating on getting all those magical moments during the wedding and reception, when you would want your loved ones to be concentrating on experiencing the magic firsthand**.

But a very easy and traditional old fashioned country wedding is available to you at very low cost. This is the small afternoon affair for a select crowd. Provide only midcentury homemade treats: sausage balls (Bisquick, grated cheese, sausage) and cream cheese mints (powdered sugar, cream cheese, mint extract). Provide punch (7-Up, Kool-Aid, scoops of sherbet). Have the wedding in the backyard, it's nice out there in October. Have a responsible and trusted friend officiate. Invite only close family over the age of 16, only your closest friends. Wear nice new clothes, but keep it to things you really will wear again. It sounds cute and old-fashioned and I mean to recommend it to all my young friends.
